Out and about

A lot of method ringing has started up in the last 2 months, so much it's hard to keep track. On the plain methods, Double, Little Bob, Reverse, St Clements and Double Oxford have been rung, 1 Lead of Little Fransham Little Bob adds a useful 6 changes when you're struggling with some date touches.

On Treble Bob, Kent and Oxford for sure, but also Morning Star Delight, College Exercise, and Norwich and Cambridge S.

On 8 bells, Plain, Little, Gainsborough have all had an outing.

A physical quarter of Yorkshire S Major was lost past the half-way mark, we are grateful to Ali Lucas for travelling over from beyond Skipton for the attempt.

Another "real" quarter of Little Bob Minor hit the wall at about 800 changes.

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The Learning Curve.

Bell ringing (<u>ringing</u>, as opposed to conducting, teaching, etc), has two major components:

- Method knowledge
- Execution skill

The balance between these two varies according to the talents of the ringer and the difficulty of the method. In handbell ringing it's all too easy to fall into a cosy comfort zone of double blue lines, and have to spend hours learning those lines just to ring a course of a new method.

A more skilful approach is to learn the structure of the method, i.e. how the bells fit together and especially with the treble, and to acquire the skill of ringing to the structure. But, like all skills, practice is needed to get good at the approach.

So in one of my e-mails early in the month, I wrote:

"However, it's more valuable to try to ring by the structure and fail to get back to rounds, than to learn the lines and not develop the awareness of treble position and the associated places."

Failure is part of the learning process, especially if the cause of the failure is evident.

Of course, better still is to ring by the structure and successfully get back to rounds. It's also easier after a good night's sleep!

1,000 courses is not too many, unless it applies to every method!

The Yellow Brick Road

The ambitious ringer will want to charge along "the yellow brick ringing road" at full speed, whilst the thorough ringer will want to enjoy some diversions along the way. Sometimes stepping stones are a good idea.
