The following day we had a practice session with **Rebecca** where we added more insight to her understanding of bobs and singles in 1-2 to Plain Bob Minor. We rang a variety of touches up to a 240.

The builders then finally descended on the Church household which supressed handbell ringing temporarily, it re-surfaced chez **Ros Baxter** on 15th May. A very busy session included some stonkingly good Plain Bob, and a course of Kent TB Minor for **Chris (C)** on 5-6.

The capability in this group is growing and we look forward to some more recorded lengths during the year.

The following week we were without *Neil* and *Rebecca*, but we did have a visitor from Oxford, **Lindsay Palmer**. Lindsay's presence was very welcome, she enabled several courses of PB Major which otherwise might not have taken place.

On our last Tuesday in the month and the third week where we rang at the home of Ros and Barry Baxter we again met with a total of 8 ringers. We tried splitting across two rooms to make the most of the time, but we were just not quite strong enough to make two bands work properly.
